2021 was certainly about keeping our community healthier, with the ever-present goal of getting everyone better at life. It was a year of adjustments as we continued to deal with the different COVID variants while working to bring back some programming, activities, and visitation with family and friends for the individuals we support and their families.

To achieve our goal, we needed to vaccinate our staff and those in our care aggressively. Through an amazing partnership with the Capital Region Vaccination Hub coordinated through Albany Medical Center, we ensured that the disability community got access early in the process. While managing the pandemic accounted for a disproportionate amount of our efforts, we also continued to advance innovation through the Health Innovations Incubator and Technology Center (HII Tech), the research and development division of the Center. In July 2021, Dr. Eric Ledet joined us on a full-time basis as the Vice President of Research and Development and Director of HII Tech. Dr. Ledet is a Biomedical Engineer with extensive experience

in the medical field, in addition to the 10 years of knowledge in the disability field he has gained working with the Center on other projects. He leads a team that will continue to develop products to improve the independence and lives of individuals with disabilities, such as our patent-pending oral hygiene product. We are excited for the future of our incubator, and the impact that we can make for individuals with disabilities, allowing them to be more independent and inclusive in their community.

As we look back on 2021, the truly heroic efforts of our staff shine brightly. From the beginning of this pandemic, we have had to make constant adjustments, many of which change the day-to-day routine of our staff. Regulations changed often, sometimes multiple times per day, as information became available and new variants started to emerge. Our staff remained committed to keeping the individuals in their care as safe as possible, and went above and beyond to make sure that family members were able to stay in communication when a particular home or program was closed to outside visitation.

Our staff did what they always do—they put the needs of the individuals in their care first. This is why our staff are so valued by family members and our agency. They embody our mission, and



we value each of them and want to highlight their dedication and commitment.

We look forward to the balance of 2022 with the hope that we emerge from the grips of this pandemic and start seeing people back together with a new set of priorities and expectations. We certainly never could have predicted what has happened this past 18 months, and likely cannot predict the next 18 months either. Notes from a busy 2021 of supportive programs

Day Programs

As 2021 progressed, the Center slowly, but safely, began to return to in-person programming. Of course, COVID-19 was and continues to be an ever-present concern, but across our programs and services, we were able to increase the number of individuals served in our day program sites and began visitation at St. Margaret's Center in accordance with State guidelines and agency established protocol.

The Center's New Karner site was opened as a rec center for some individuals who have not been able to return back to their day program, providing an opportunity for individuals to come together, socialize, and participate in a variety of different activities.

Down Syndrome Aim High Resource Center

In 2021, the Down Syndrome Aim High Resource Center provided 25 Expectant/New Parent Packets with critical resources at area hospitals, and delivered 10 Welcome Baby baskets to new parents. DSAHRC also provided Professional Development & Educational Consultation on successful strategies for education of

students with disabilities to 66 Education Professionals (Teachers, Administrators, and Teaching Assistants).

Education

Congratulations to the graduates of the Kevin G. Langan School Class of 2021! Chloe, Taylor, Talia, Brian, Rashad, Timothy, and Shakeem have all worked very hard over their many years at Langan School to achieve their diplomas. It was a wonderful outdoor graduation, with inspiring words from commencement speaker, Siena College president Dr. Chris Gibson. A very special thank you to our dedicated and caring staff, who nurtured, educated, and supported these graduates, and helped them reach their goals. Your work was on display last evening, and you should be very proud of the accomplishments of these 7 graduates.

Also in 2021, push-in educational services were brought to the residents' living spaces and two classrooms at St. Margaret's Center to maximize learning opportunities for students who have not returned to Langan School due to the pandemic.

St. Margaret's Center

In March, 2021, the MDRT Foundation awarded a \$5,000 grant to assist with a bedroom renovation project at St. Margaret's Center, the Center's pediatric and adolescent nursing home. In addition, a grant from the JM McDonald Foundation helped St. Margaret's acquire a ceiling projector that allows children and young adults interact with a virtual display on the floor, complete with engaging graphics and sounds that encourage interaction, discovery, and play.

Family Services

In 2021, the Center opened a new freestanding respite location in Queensbury. This facility will provide much needed respite services to families and caregivers in and around the North Country. The new facility will allow us to provide respite services to 15 people in the day to early evening hours and 8 people overnight, with services available to individuals aged 6 and up living with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities.

Residential Services

New Adult Recreation Programs are now offered at Corporate Circle and 700 South Pearl Street.



Phase II renovations and upgrades to Center Health Care's Dental Clinic are now complete thanks to grants from the Mother Cabrini Health Foundation, Cohoes Savings Foundation, Hearst Foundation, and Jacob & Sophie Rice Family Foundation. The dental clinic was started in the late 1970's in a one room office in the Center's school program and has evolved over the years into a state-of-the-art clinic that provides services to the Capital Region community.

Bridging the vaccine gap for vulnerable community members

2021 began with a full court press to ensure that individuals with disabilities and all of our community members had access to COVID-19 vaccinations. In January 2021, the Center for **Disability Services began administering** COVID-19 vaccinations to front line staff, program participants, and members of the general community.

This effort bloomed over the year, from 400 shots administered on the first day, to over 7.000 doses.

This undertaking was coordinated through the Albany Vaccine Hub led by Albany Medical Center, County governments, and through the incredible dedication of our Center

Health Care staff, residential nurses, and various support staff. We have received many notes and calls from the community, and from other agencies, identifying the professionalism of our staff, and the gratitude for the ability to receive this vaccine in an accessible building, with all the necessary supports available.

There are many people to thank for this incredible effort, but we must identify Ruth Leslie from Albany Medical Center who oversaw the Capital Region Vaccination Hub, and the Albany Medical Center Leadership who prioritized individuals with disabilities, and Maureen O'Brien President and CEO of NYS Industries for the Disabled who represented the disability community on the Capital Region Hub. We also need to thank both Albany Medical Center and St. Peter's Health Partners for supplying our agency with the necessary vaccines, and Center nurses, and staff who arranged the clinics, administered the vaccine, and did a lot of work in registering individuals, scheduling appointments, and following through on second shots. The Center for Disability Services was awarded a Proclamation from the New York State Assembly and Senate for the work done through this clinic and the impact it had on our community. Because our staff and those we support are primarily vaccinated the Center was able to re-open our schools, some programs, and allow for visitation, obviously with limitations and safety protocols which we have followed and amended since March of 2020.

HII TECH: local innovation with global impact

2021 saw the official launch of the Health Innovations Incubator & Technology Center (HII Tech), formerly known as the Life Quality Solutions Incubator. HII Tech, led by Dr. Eric Ledet, Vice President, Research & Development, is the Center's research and development division, working to further the Center's mission, through technology and assistive products.

HII Tech's products in various stages of development include an innovative toothbrush specially designed for use by a caregiver, and tools for wheelchair users to navigate nonaccessible space and mitigate pressure ulcers (bed sores) that commonly result from wheelchair use.

In 2021, HI Tech was also the recipient of a grant from the Bender Scientific Fund of the Community Foundation for the Greater Capital Region. With this funding, the Center was able to purchase a laser cutter for use by HII Tech's team of engineers and research and development fellows to cut and produce face shields in response to COVID-19.

Center President and CEO Greg Sorrentino was

honored as an Empire Blue Cross Whole Health Hero for his leadership at the Center and his efforts in ensuring continuity of care throughout the pandemic.

The Center was also named as one of the Leaders in Diversity, Equity & Inclusion by the Albany Business Review.

Several Center staff members were honored at the 75th Cerebral Palsy of New York State Annual Conference, including: Don Shorts, Senior Day Program Counselor, Stacie Sprague Cousineau, Special Education Teacher, Lameeka Tarver, Resident Counselor and Montoya Burt, Certified Nursing Assistant. In addition, NYSID President and CEO, and longtime friend of the Center, Maureen O'Brien, received the Anthony J. Koenig Volunteer Service Award.

Fundraising

In 2021, the Center was able to hold several of our signature fundraising events. In January, our annual #518 gives telethon was completely virtual due to the pandemic, but the event was lively and filled with captivating performances and heartwarming stories. Celebrity appearances by musical artists Sawyer Fredericks, Madison VanDenburg, Moriah Formica, and Billy Gilman and special appearances by NY Giants Dion Lewis and NY

Yankees Aaron Boon made the event a memorable success.

Later in the year, the Center was able to host more of our signature fundraising events in person, including the Shoppes at Newton Plaza Siro's Cup in July to kick off the Saratoga Racing Season, honoring Marylou Whitney (posthumously) and Chef Tom Dillon (posthumously), the Million Dollar Beach Volleyball Tournament to benefit Prospect Center, An
